*Inclusive accommodation will be for the evening of Thursday 24 June and will be a room based on campus, in the Halls of Residence.

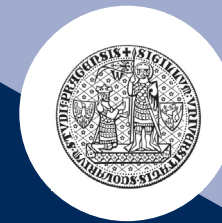

Keynote speakers

Professor Tony Booth (Canterbury Christ Church University)

Tony Booth has researched, written and taught on issues of inclusion and exclusion over more than 30 years. He has authored and co-authored several books linking inclusion explicitly with values-based and rights-based education, education for sustainable communities and environments, ensuring that education links local with global understandings. He is the principal author of the “Index for Inclusion” and a version of the “Index for early years and childcare”. He co-authored with Mel Ainscow and Alan Dyson “Improving schools, developing inclusion”, and with Mel Ainscow “From them to us; an international study of inclusion in education”. He has travelled widely, speaking at international conferences and working with groups of colleagues around the world.

Professor Felicity Armstrong (Institute of Education, London)

Professor of Education at the Institute of Education University of London, Felicity Armstrong’s work focuses primarily on policy and practices relating to inclusive education in local, national and international contexts and Disability Studies. She is leader of the Inclusive Education Special Interest Group at the Institute of Education. Her specific research interests include inclusive education, policy, practice, comparative research, action research, and cross-disciplinary enquiry (history, cultural geography).

She is a member of the editorial boards of Disability and Society, International Journal of Inclusive Education, Alter (French) Reliance: La Revue du Collectif de Recherches, Situations de Handicap, Education, Sociétés (French), British Educational Research Journal, Cambridge Journal of Education, Comparative Education, History of Education, Policy Studies in Education, Scandinavian Journal of Disability Research.

Ingrid Kroner (President of Inclusion Europe)

Ingrid Kroner was involved in the Inclusion Movement since 1977. A mother of a child with Down Syndrome, she fought tirelessly for human rights for people with intellectual disabilities in all spheres of society. She has been associated with Inclusion International since 1994 and was appointed as President of Inclusion Europe in 2006. She also serves as Vice-President of the National German association of people with intellectual disabilities and their families.

Her work has included involvement on the Task Force for the International Year of the Families. Among her greatest achievements has been her influence as a speaker for parent groups in the German Federal State of Hamburg on changing the system towards inclusive education and residential support services to achieve independent living. Since then she has chaired the Supervisory Council of the Supported Employment Service in Hamburg and has been a member of the European Coalition for Community Living (ECCL).
